On a Spíritual Note ...

Jesus wanted Zacchaeus. It was not so much the other way around: yes, Zacchaeus was curious about Jesus, and the Gospel tells us he wanted to "see who Jesus was," but that was all. Jesus takes the initiative by calling to Zacchaeus. Jesus declares that salvation has come to his house, wants to stay at his house, and Jesus says that Zacchaeus is a descendant of Abraham. All Zacchaeus had done was climb a tree!

That is the beauty of the way Luke pictures Jesus for us: that is the way Luke tells us what God is like. In the story of the Prodigal Son, it is the father who watches each day for the "no-good" son to appear on the horizon; and when he does, it is the father who runs to him, kisses him, and throws a celebration. And then when the other son, the faithful one, is hurt and angry, it is the father who comes out to him and talks heart-to-heart. In this story, Jesus is telling us that this is what God the Father feels about us. Imagine!

The picture is very clear. God would not have created you or me unless he loved us very much before we were even conceived!!! And even when we sin, and forget his love, and act as though he were not there, he never gives up on us, like the father of the prodigal son. He rebukes us, but forgives us, and keeps nudging us back to his embrace.

This is the God Saint Martin de Porres, our patron saint, whom we are celebrating today, believed in. Martin took God's love so seriously that he wanted to spread it everywhere, and so he is the patron of universal brotherhood and sisterhood. He is the patron of racial harmony. Martin just could not imagine leaving anyone out of God's embrace.

What an awesome God we have!!! What an awesome patron saint he has given us!

Archbishop Charles Chaput will celebrate Mass in honor of St. Martin de Porres on **Thursday**, Nov. 7 at the Cathedral Basilica of SS. Peter and Paul.

Sponsored by the Archdiocese's Office for Black Catholics, the liturgy will be preceded by a choral prelude at 6:30 p.m. from the Mercy Career and Technical High School Gospel Choir.

The Philadelphia Catholic Gospel Choir, under the direction of Tonya Dorsey, will sing during the Mass.

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The annual liturgy will mark Black Catholic History Month, inaugurated in 1990 by the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the U.S. November was designated for this observance due to the feast days of two African saints: St. Augustine of Hippo on Nov. 13, and St. Martin de Porres on Nov. 3.

Born in 16th-century Peru, St. Martin de Porres was the son of a Spanish nobleman and a freed Panamanian woman. Rejected by his father due to his dark skin, de Porres grew up in poverty with his mother and sister, becoming a barber's apprentice during his adolescence. He eventually entered the Dominican order, where he became known for his piety, humility and generosity, as well as his devotion to the Eucharist and abstinence from meat.

Canonized in 1962, St. Martin de Porres is invoked as a patron saint of social justice, race relations and interracial marriages,

as well as radio, barbers and hairdressers.
