

What a joyful day it was when on November 7, 1982 along with six other African American men, Mr. Stephen Hopkins was ordained as a Permanent Deacon in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia at the Cathedral Basilica of Saints Peter and Paul by John Cardinal Krol. This special group of men had a special name for themselves known as “The Magnificent Seven.”

Deacon Hopkins was assigned to Saint Benedict Parish where he served as a deacon for 39 years until his retirement. In 2013 Saint Benedict Parish merged with Saint Athanasius Parish. Deacon Hopkins continued to be active there as well. Deacon Hopkins was a blessing to all those he met on his journey of life. He preached the Good News and became a witness when God put in his heart to walk the walk and talk the talk.

We give you thanks for blessing us and for being a man of humility. You sought the needs of others, rather than seeking your own. You gave us Faith, you gave us Hope and you gave us Love. We remember and we celebrate a life well lived.

Dr. Valerie Lewis-Mosley engages faith and culture through the lens of Black Catholic spirituality. She is an evangelist that uses narrative storytelling to empower and lead others to conversion. She is a Lay Associate Order of Preachers - Caldwell Dominicans. She uses her Dominican Spirituality and Jesuit roots to facilitate her work as a Social Justice Advocate: to combat racism, and disparities in healthcare access and within society and the church. She is an Adjunct Professor of Theology at Caldwell University. She is also a member of the Black Catholic Theological Symposium (BCTS). She is on the faculty at The Institute for Black Catholic Studies at Xavier University of Louisiana.

Dr. Lewis-Mosley has been involved in parish ministry as a DRE and children and youth faith formation for over thirty years. Dr. Lewis-Mosley is currently serving on the USCCB project "Journeying Together"- a discussion on youth and young adults within the Church- Listening to the Lambs.

She has written two research projects on the role of Black Catholic Lay Women in the Kingdom Building Mission of the Church and has published articles and essays in various Catholic publications, such as National Catholic Register (NCR).



Bishop Edward Braxton, the only Catholic bishop who has consistently written on race matters, begins this timely book with a probing personal introduction. He describes his family's history and his experience as an African American that he brought to his ministry as a Catholic priest and bishop.
