Stay Awake

The central theme of today's readings is the importance for us, as followers of Christ, to believe in God's promises completely, trusting in Him fully, and to stay vigilant, always ready to encounter our God as our Judge and Rewarder at the uncertain time of our death. Faithfulness in doing God's will is the best way to prepare for our death.

The first reading highlights the faith-filled preparedness of the ancient Hebrew enslaved people in Egypt before their mass exodus to the Promised Land. Their trusting faith in God's promises gave them hope. We are told how their faith and hope led to their liberation. With expectant hope, the Hebrews obediently sacrificed the first Passover lamb and ate the first ritual meal, as prescribed by their God through Moses. They awaited their imminent release and were ready for it.

In the Second Reading, taken from the last chapter of the letter to the Hebrews, Paul defines Faith as "the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). He seeks to strengthen the Faith of the Jewish Christians (the Hebrews) by appealing to the example of their ancestors, starting with Abraham, and reviewing the things they accomplished through Faith.

In the Gospel, Jesus challenges his disciples to trust the Father's promise of eternal happiness in His kingdom. However, they must always be prepared because the Son of Man will come unexpectedly, either at the moment of their death or at the end of the world. Using the master-thief parable, Jesus warns us to stay alert so that the thief (the devil) does not steal our treasure of Divine grace through temptations. With the master-servant parable, Jesus reminds us that we must always do God's will by obeying Jesus' commandment of love and by offering humble, sacrificial service to others.

We must stay vigilant and prepared to face the Lord. One traditional way to stay alert is through prayer. The most important part of prayer is listening to God – an attitude of paying attention to the "tiny whispering sound" of the Lord (1 Kgs 19:11-12). Such attentiveness requires us to set aside quiet time each day to tune our ears to God's sounds of love, harmony, and peace. Let us remember the words of the Book of Revelation: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will enter his house and dine with him and he with me" (3:20).

"Waiting for Christ to return" means working toward the coming of the Kingdom of God. This includes doing God's will by humbly serving others, fighting poverty, ending hatred that divides us, establishing peace among individuals and nations, reducing pride that leads to confrontation, and building social structures that respect the dignity of every person. We must wait for the Lord daily by learning to see Jesus in the least of our brothers and sisters. In other words, we must be ready to serve Jesus in whatever form he takes. What we often find in "serving" others is that God comes to us through them.
