## **Moral Courage in Preaching the Gospel**

James Garfield once said that the truth will set you free, but first it will make you miserable. This means that while accepting and acknowledging reality can lead to positive change and liberation, the initial process of facing brutal truths can be painful and uncomfortable. It is by courageously living out our religious convictions with commitment, as Jeremiah, Paul, and Jesus did, even if doing so causes divisions in families and society and invites suffering and death. If no one is ever offended by the quality of our commitment to Christ, then perhaps we are practicing "inoffensive Christianity."

Jeremiah, in our first reading, is shown as experiencing God's fiery word burning inside him. His preaching divided the city and caused such opposition that people wanted to kill him. Showing the courage of his prophetic calling, he told the king that the Lord had said he must surrender to the powerful Babylonian army to save Israel. Fearing how the nobles would react to this command to surrender, the king silenced Jeremiah and refused to obey God's word. As a result, Jeremiah was cast into a deep, muddy, unused cistern to die for his "treason." Standing in this prophetic tradition, Paul, in the second reading, urges Judeo-Christians to stay firm in their faith in Jesus, despite the ostracism enforced by their former Jewish community.

In today's Gospel, Jesus preaches the word of God, which continues to divide families—a word he knew would ultimately lead to his death. The fire Jesus brings is the fire of love and hope. The disruption, division, and revolution caused by Jesus and his faithful followers through sacrificial love and justice are necessary to repair what's broken, put right what's misplaced, and cleanse what's infected in the world and the Body of Christ. In other words, the healing pain caused by Jesus' ideas and ideals is essential for establishing God's true shalom. Although Jesus brings a "sword" and causes division, he is the one who offers the only true and lasting peace. In pursuing his mission, Jesus creates division because some follow him and others oppose him.

Be God's prophets and God's microphones. God sends His prophets to deliver His message to the world in every century. Saint Oscar Romero, Archbishop and Martyr; Saint Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa; canonized October 4, 2016, by Pope Francis), Pope St. John Paul II, Nelson Mandela, Desmond Tutu, Martin Luther King, Fannie Lou Hamer, Dom Helder Camara, Maura Clark, Dorothy Kazel, Ita Ford, Jeanne Donovan, and Ella Baker were all twentieth-century prophets who had the courage of their Christian convictions to follow Jesus and proclaim His unfiltered message, which "cast fire on earth" and caused healthy division in society, as today's Gospel points out.

We should keep the fire of Christ burning in our hearts: On our baptism day, we received the light of Christ and were told to keep that flame shining brightly until Christ Jesus comes again. Additionally, the Holy Spirit was sent into our hearts through Baptism and Confirmation to help ignite our faith. "One who is on fire cannot sit on a chair." So, as passionate Christians, we need to inspire others to care for, serve, and bless one another with all the gifts of faith. We should allow that fire to burn away impurities within us and reveal the purity of the gold and silver inside.
