

#### The Rich Man and Lazarus

The parable that challenged Dr. Albert Schweitzer is the story of the rich man and Lazarus. This story Jesus told inspired a man with three doctoral degrees (in medicine, theology, and philosophy) to return to school to study medicine, leave civilization with all its culture and comforts, and move to the jungles of Africa to serve as a missionary doctor for 47 years. At age 43, he left for Africa, where he opened a hospital on the edge of the jungle in what was then called Equatorial Africa. He died there in 1965 at age 90. The man, of course, was Dr. Albert Schweitzer, who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1952. The single parable that, according to him, radically changed his life was our text for this morning, the parable of the rich man and Lazarus, the beggar. That parable convinced Schweitzer that wealthy Europe should share its resources with poor Africa and that he should start the process.

The parable is told as a one-act play with two scenes. The first scene shows the luxurious life of the rich man, who wears expensive clothes and enjoys five-course meals every day. In contrast, the poor, sick beggar lives in the street by the rich man's front door, fighting with stray dogs for crumbs from the rich man's table. The name 'Lazarus' means 'God is my help.' Despite experiencing misfortune and suffering, Lazarus remains hopeful in God. When the second scene begins, the situation switches. Lazarus is now enjoying heavenly bliss as a reward for his faithfulness to God during his poverty and suffering, while the rich man is suffering in Hell as punishment for failing to show mercy to the poor and for not sharing God's blessings with Lazarus at his door.

The sin of the rich man was that he never saw Lazarus as a person or a brother. Lazarus represents a reality: the poor, the sick, and the unfortunate who are always around us. The rich man did no wrong, but he also did nothing right. He was insensitive. He neither recognized Lazarus, who was right outside his gate, nor understood his Godcommanded duty in charity and justice to help him!

Christ is the truly wealthy man who has made himself completely poor for our sake, as He left the riches of Heaven to experience our spiritual poverty on Earth. He comes to us not only through Holy Communion, which is, by far, His greatest gift to us, but also in people with low incomes. He is the poor man who sits at our doorsteps and on our streets. He conceals the wounds of the Cross beneath those of addiction and poverty. He suffers in all who are poor, needy, or abandoned — from the child in the womb to the older adult dying alone, from the poorest of the poor in Africa to those unjustly imprisoned. What we do or fail to do for them, we do or fail to do for Jesus.

Our choices here shape the kind of eternity we will experience. It has been said: "Where we go hereafter depends on what we 'go after,' here!" The destination depends on the path we take. We get what we choose and what we live for. We are forming our moral character to fit forever in one of two places. We are all fortunate enough to share our blessings with others. God has blessed each of us with wealth, health, special talents, social power, political influence, or a combination of many blessings. The parable encourages us to share what we have received with others in various ways instead of using everything solely for selfish gains.
