Faith in Action

All three readings for the 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time highlight the importance of "Faith" and how it functions in our lives. They offer us three perspectives on Faith. 1) The theological virtue of Faith allows us to believe that something is true and trustworthy simply because it has been revealed to us by God. 2) In his instructions to Timothy, Paul, who elsewhere described Faith as "the assurance of the things hoped for" (Heb 11:1), presents Faith as a believing, trusting, loving relationship with Christ. 3) Finally, Christian Faith is the act of trusting in God, demonstrated by our steady loyalty, fidelity, and complete dedication to Him—shown through offering ourselves to Him in humble, loving service.

In today's Gospel, Jesus teaches His Apostles that faith enables us to share in God's power, and even a small amount of deep faith can allow Him to perform miracles in our lives and the lives of others. It is faith that makes a person just, positioning them rightly with God and their neighbors. In the Bible, faith refers to reliance on or confidence in God, while hope is the expectation of a better future, accompanied by the means to achieve it. Although the Apostles ask for an increase in the amount of their faith, Jesus reminds them—and us—that the quality of faith is more important than its quantity. Using a master-servant parable, Jesus also teaches us that for faith to be effective, it must be connected with trust, loving obedience, and total commitment—an active submission to God and a willingness to do whatever He commands.

We should thank God for everything, giving Him credit for our well-being. Following the example of the Apostles, we must pray for increased faith and trust in God. Most of us tend to forget God's providence when our earthly affairs are going well. How often do we thank Him when we enjoy good health or when our home life and business are running smoothly? How many of us thank God for all the gifts we have received? We often attribute our good health to proper food and exercise.

We must strengthen our faith by becoming faithful servants of God. A passionate Christian can better demonstrate to their neighbor the importance of God and living righteously through everyday actions than by explaining religious doctrines. A genuine Christian can find many ways to help make Christ known to their neighbor. A kind word, a generous gesture, or an unselfish concern for a neighbor's troubles can be more effective than a series of sermons from some renowned theologian.

We need to grow in faith by using the means Christ has provided through His Church. We must nurture our faith through prayer, Bible study, and leading a disciplined spiritual life. Since faith is a gift from God, we should pray for Him to increase our faith. Spending time in prayer with God is essential for developing faith. We need to pray for a faith strong enough to overcome the daily difficulties and crises we face. Additionally, fellowship with other believers strengthens our faith. Therefore, participating in the Holy Mass ("the mystery of Faith") and engaging in church life are vital. Through the Eucharistic Meal on the altar and the Sacramental graces available to us, we are not unprofitable servants but instruments and agents of Jesus, who, through Divine Love, helps us produce a harvest worthy of Him. We grow in faith as we act in faith. Exercising faith strengthens every gift of God.

The parable of the under-appreciated servant teaches us that faith requires action. It also offers a lesson in theological humility, reminding us that, as followers of Jesus, we are God's servants. This is clear in the parable about the master who expects his servant to carry out his orders. When the servant returns from working in the fields, he still has housework to do. His master does not feel indebted to him for his fidelity in doing what is part of his duty. Similarly, the Apostles and we are expected to carry out the orders Jesus gives us. They and we are the servants of the Gospel. Therefore, we can never feel that we have worked "enough."
