

#### The Habit of Thanksgiving

Izak Walton once said that God has two dwellings: one in heaven and the other in a humble and grateful heart. If thanksgiving were the only prayer we offered, it would be enough because we owe everything to God. We are familiar with the parable of the nine ungrateful lepers; no story in all the Gospels so powerfully illustrates man's ingratitude. The lepers approached Jesus with desperate longing, and the merciful Lord healed them. But nine of them never returned to thank Him. The Samaritan is the hero of this story. The gratitude and praise of the Samaritans were a natural response to God's unmerited mercy. The Samaritan knew he was in the right place at the right time, and such an opportunity might never come again. He had not earned God's kindness; he simply asked for it—and it was freely given. He understood he couldn't earn it; he was an outsider, a Samaritan. By accepting God's grace, his natural response was to give thanks and praise.

In both the Old and New Testaments, God laments mankind's ingratitude. "Hear, O heavens, and listen, O earth, for the LORD speaks: Sons have I raised and reared, but they have disowned me! An ox knows its owner, and an ass its master's manger; but Israel does not know, my people have not understood. Ah! Sinful nation, people laden with wickedness, evil race, corrupt children! They have forsaken the LORD, spurned the Holy One of Israel, and apostatized" (Isaiah 1:2-4). "He came to what was his own, but his own people did not accept him" (John 1:11). Therefore, the Word of God encourages us to be thankful. "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him" (Colossians 3:17).

Although we receive so much from God, we often take everything as our right, without recognizing or appreciating that everything we have or receive is His gift. We allow the negatives in our lives to obscure the blessings He provides — minor issues like health problems, financial worries, or conflicts with a neighbor, coworker, or spouse. Additionally, we are often thankful only when we compare ourselves to less fortunate people. In times of need, we pray with desperate intensity, but as time goes on, we forget about God.

Many of us forget to ask for God's blessing on ourselves and the food He provides before meals and to offer Him a prayer of thanks after each meal. We often neglect to set aside time for family prayers of praise, gratitude, contrition, and petition. God gave us His only begotten Son, yet we rarely thank Him. Additionally, we often take our parents for granted, considering them a nuisance, despite having depended on them for almost everything in the past. Similarly, we owe an outstanding debt of gratitude to our families, friends, teachers, doctors, bosses, employees, and pastors, yet we often forget to express our thanks. Moving forward, let us be filled with daily gratitude to God and others for the countless blessings we've received. We can show our appreciation to our loving, forgiving God by forgiving and loving others and by reflecting His love, mercy, and compassion in everyone He dwells in, whether we recognize it or not. Let us turn back to Him daily in repentance and gratitude. In short, we should cultivate '...an attitude of gratitude.'
