

## The Temple of God

Today, the Church marks the anniversary of the dedication of the Cathedral Church of Rome by Pope Sylvester I in AD 324. This church functions as the episcopal seat of the Pope, who is the Bishop of Rome, and is therefore called "the Mother and Head of all Churches of Rome and the world." It is known as St. John Lateran Basilica because it was built on land donated to the Church by the Lateran family, and because monks from the monasteries of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Divine served there.

This celebration invites us to reflect on the reverence owed to God who dwells in this church. The church is the most sacred place because it is God's House and deserves the highest respect. The water flowing from the river symbolizes life from God and the blessings flowing from His throne. The imagery of the fruit trees and life-giving water in the first reading reminds us that the Church and the sacraments offer spiritual nourishment and healing for those who believe.

From the second reading, we learn that the Church is a holy place because the Holy Spirit dwells within it. This calls us to recognize the sacredness of the community and to live in a way that respects this divine presence. Paul gives a serious warning: anyone who destroys this temple, which is the Church, will be destroyed by God. This destruction can result from false teaching, division, or immorality that threaten the community's unity and holiness.

Today's Gospel presents the powerful story of Jesus clearing the Temple in Jerusalem. He expelled its merchants and moneychangers with strong feelings against the corrupt commercialization of a House of Prayer and the exploitation of poor pilgrims in the name of religion. The issues that angered Jesus were 1) turning a prayerful space into a bustling marketplace and 2) unfair business practices by animal sellers and moneychangers, supported by the Temple leaders. Therefore, Jesus crafted a whip of cords and drove out the animals and moneychangers, quoting Zechariah the prophet: "Stop making my Father's house a marketplace" (Zechariah 14:21).

The passage reminds us that the Church and each believer are called to be a living temple, free from the impurities of commercialism, greed, and sin. Just as the physical temple needed cleansing, so do our hearts and souls require ongoing spiritual work and renewal. The focus is on preparing our hearts to be open to God's Word and presence, rather than being distracted by external things or material gain.

We must offer living worship to a living God. If our God is the God of the living, our worship of God must also be alive. This means our participation in prayers and songs during the Holy Mass should be lively, and our behavior in church should be reverent, as we offer our lives and all our activities to our living God on the altar with repentant and grateful hearts.

We must abandon the business mindset of profit and loss in divine worship. Our relationship with God should be that of children to parents — built on love, respect, and a desire for mutual good, without thoughts of gain or loss on either side.

We need to remember that we are the temples of the Holy Spirit. Hence, we have no right to desecrate God's temple by impurity, injustice, pride, hatred, or jealousy.
